Empirical Summer Program in Applied Multi-Ethnic Research at the Inter-University Consortium for Political & Social Research (ICPSR)

June 25 to July 20, 2007

Program Description

ESIN is supporting a set of inter-related training activities to be held in the summer and hosted at the University of Michigan. ESIN members will be given the choice to register for the following training options along with seminars centered on career development (i.e., tips on preparing a tenure statement, grant writing, the review process, etc.). Training options include the following:

- **Methodological Issues in Quantitative Research on Race and Ethnicity** (4 week program: June 25 - July 20). This competitive workshop examines research design, measurement, and analysis issues in quantitative research on racial and ethnic minority populations in the United States.
- **Advanced Statistical Workshops** (4 week program: June 25 - July 20). Participants in the Advanced Statistical Workshops option will choose from various courses that may include but are not limited to Advanced Multivariate Statistical Methods, Bayesian Methods for the Social and Behavioral Sciences, Regression Analysis III: Advanced Methods, "LISREL" Models: General Structural Equations. These courses combine lectures and discussion with the practical application of quantitative methods in a state-of-the-art computer lab.
- **Center for Statistical Consultation and Research Workshops** (3 week program: July 2 - July 20). Participants in these workshops will choose from various workshops that may include but are not limited to Issues in Analysis of Complex Sample Survey Data, Comparative Studies: Matching, Adjustment, and Propensity Scores, Introduction to SAS, Introduction to Stata and Introduction to SPSS.

12 Stipends of up to \$2500 each are available to support ESIN summer program applicants (individuals & study group members)

How to Apply

Only current ESIN members can apply for the program.

Program application materials will be submitted online. Individuals and study groups need the following to apply:

1. Research Plan

Concise description (2-3 pages) of research plans for the summer including:

- Specific goals, objectives, outcomes and corresponding timelines;
- Statement of how participation in this program would be advantageous to the professional growth of the individual or study group as a whole; and
- Detailed description of the paper to be developed and presented during the program.

2. Curriculum Vitae

- Each individual must upload a current CV, including each member of a study group.

3. Research Papers

- One example of a research manuscript from each individual and study group member demonstrating your potential for rigorous research (e.g., peer reviewed or referred article, chapter or conference paper).

Institute Eligibility

- ESIN Member
- U.S. citizen or permanent resident
- Ph.D, M.D., or equivalent degree, or Ph.D. candidate
